

Helping Small Businesses Grow

Small businesses play a major role in high-speed rail. The California High-Speed Rail Authority (Authority) is putting small, minority, women, and veteran owned businesses to work in the state of California.

SMALL BUSINESS PROGRAM

The Authority developed the Small Business (SB) Program to provide small businesses with the guidance and tools needed to participate on the high-speed rail project. The SB Program provides oversight which is a hybrid between adhering to statutes (federal and state), and advocacy which equals, outreach, education and supportive services. The Authority is committed to making active participation of small businesses a priority in all contracting phases of the high-speed rail project.

WHAT IS THE SMALL BUSINESS PARTICIPATION GOAL?

The small business (SB) participation goal is a combined goal of 30% for all small businesses inclusive of Micro/Small Businesses (SB), Disadvantaged Business Enterprises (DBE) and Disabled Veteran Business Enterprises (DVBE).

THE 30% SMALL BUSINESS GOAL INCLUDES:

10% Disadvantaged Business Enterprises (DBE) participation

3% Disabled Veteran Business Enterprises (DVBE) participation

The Authority is not a certifying agency. However, to participate in the High-Speed Rail SB Program, a firm must be certified by one of the certifying agencies referenced below.

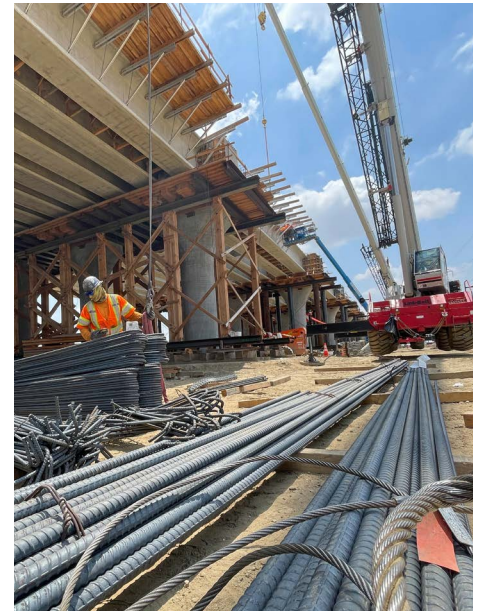

Torrent Laboratory, Inc. provides a broad range of soil testing and other services for transportation agencies. The samples this Milpitas-based environmental testing lab in California’s Silicon Valley gather help engineers on the high-speed rail project determine if the soil is suitable for construction. The results also identify toxins and contaminants like lead, arsenic, and mercury that may be hazardous to people and wildlife. Founder Mukesh Jani noted, “At the end of the day, everybody in this industry knows that it’s not about the money, it’s about the environment.”

OUTREACH

The Authority hosts pre-bid conferences, industry forums and open houses where small businesses can network and talk to prime contractors about upcoming contracts on the high-speed rail program.

The Authority issues a quarterly Small Business Newsletter to inform small businesses about the latest contract opportunities. It provides valuable resources for potential bidders to stay current on what is going on at the Authority and who is working on the program.

THE BUSINESS ADVISORY COUNCIL

The Authority’s Business Advisory Council (BAC) works in conjunction with the Small Business Program to serve as a forum to provide essential input to the Authority regarding practices that impact the small business community. Representation is comprised of statewide construction and professional service business trade associations.
