- The Authority has not made a penalty payment in over eight years (98 months) and did not have any aged invoices in the March 2025 reporting period.
- The Authority currently has a total of \$239.3M in disputed invoices, which represents a \$8.0M decrease in total disputes from the prior month. One contract accounts for 98.6% of the dispute total.

- The Proposition 1A cash balance fell \$91.2M month-over-month to \$579.4M. This decrease is due to expenditures of \$91.2M.
 - The Authority has \$523.3M available through commercial paper which was authorized in Spring 2025.
- The Cap-and-Trade cash balance fell \$24.1M month-over-month to \$3.7B. This decrease is due to expenditures of \$24.1M.
 - o The February 2025 Cap-and-Trade auction proceeds are \$212.8M and are not reflected in cash balances.
- The Rail Property Management Fund fell \$277.2K month-over-month to \$12.4M. Payments received totaled \$202.5K and cash expenditures were \$479.7K.
 - The Rail Property Management Fund receives revenues from leases/rents collected on Authority-owned property, and proceeds are used for property-related expenditures.

- On January 10, 2025, the Governor released the FY2025-26 proposed budget, which includes an update to the current year budget (FY2024-25). In the update, the Authority's current year budget was decreased by \$995,000 (from \$111.9M to \$110.9M) to account for changes in salaries and benefits.
- At 75.0% of the Fiscal Year completed, \$58.0M or 56.9% of the Administrative Budget (\$110.9M) has been spent, resulting in a budget underutilization value of 18.1%. The budget underutilization is due to position vacancies and low OE&E spending.
- During the reporting month, the Authority completed recruitment for 11 vacant positions; however, the filled positions were offset by 9 separations, resulting in a net decrease of 2 vacant positions.
- The Authority has filled a net total of 18 vacant position(s) over the past 12 months (from 362 to 380 filled positions).
- As of March 2025, the Authority's vacancy rate is 23.4% and the statewide vacancy rate is 16.8%.

- At 75.0% of the fiscal year completed, YTD Capital Outlay expenditures are \$1.1B or 53.4% of the fiscal year forecast.
- The forecast was revised in January to reflect an updated midyear estimate of expenditures through the end of the Fiscal Year.
- Construction Package Monthly Expenditures totaled \$120.1M, which includes: CP1: \$55.0M, CP2-3: \$62.1M, and CP4: \$3.0M.
- Design-Build (DB) Monthly Expenditures totaled \$98.0M, which includes: CP1: \$45.1M, CP2-3: \$52.9M, and CP4: \$0.0.
- Monthly expenditures Time Impact Analysis (TIA) settlement payments totaling \$2.7M, which includes: CP1: \$2.7M, CP2-3: \$0.0, and CP4: \$0.0.
- The percentage of DB contract dollars expended to date for each Construction Package are as follows: CP1: 75.7%, CP2-3: 82.3%, and CP4: 99.7%.

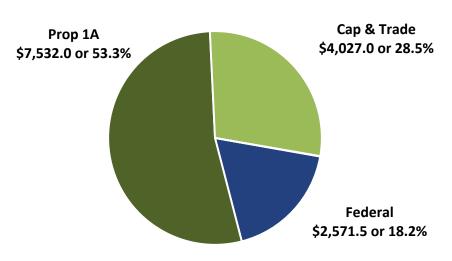

<u>Total Expenditures by Funding Source¹</u>



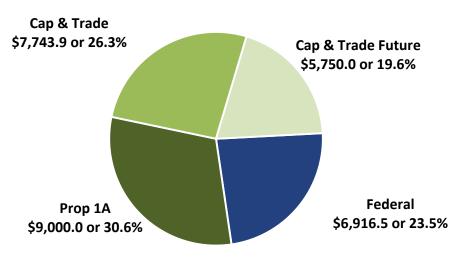

- Contracts are predominately issued for a variety of services, such as design-build and environmental work, while purchase orders are generally used to acquire goods (e.g. office supplies).
- The Authority has 201 active contracts and 116 active purchase orders (PO's) with a total value of \$12.5B.
- Month-over-Month the value of active contracts increased by \$60.1B. The change in value of active contracts is primarily due to the addition of three new contract(s) for \$324.9K, and amendment(s) of one contract(s) for 5.0M.
